- Restricted Response
- Explain cause and effect relationship
- Present relevant arguments
- Formulate tenable hypotheses, valid conclusions
- Explain methods and procedures

- Extended Response
- Produce, organise and express ideas
- Integrate learning from different areas
- Evaluate worth of ideas
- Create original forms

Marking of Essays

 Global/Holistic/ Impressionistic Marking

Analytical Marking

- Model answer assumed implicit/explicit
- 2. Subjective judgemental
- 3. Categorical scores preferred

- 1. Use of marking scheme
- 2. Give specific marks for certain points
- 3. Numerical scores preferred

Suggestions for scoring essays

- Prepare an outline of expected answer in advance
- Use the scoring method that is most appropriate
- Decide how to handle factors that are irrelevant to the learning outcomes being evaluated
- Mark all responses question by question, rather than paper by paper, shuffle scripts to avoid ordering effects
- Mark without looking at student's name
- Mark penmanship, organisation, etc. separate from content, if deemed important
- Eliminate any biases in marking
- If high stakes decisions are to be made based upon results, obtain two or more independent ratings
- Check for intra-rater and inter-rater reliability
